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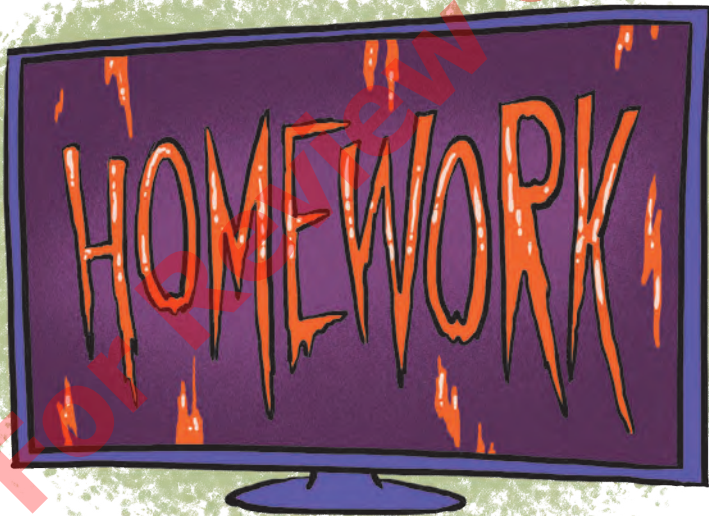

Kids have been doing homework for hundreds of years. And for hundreds of years homework has been driving children from around the world crazy.

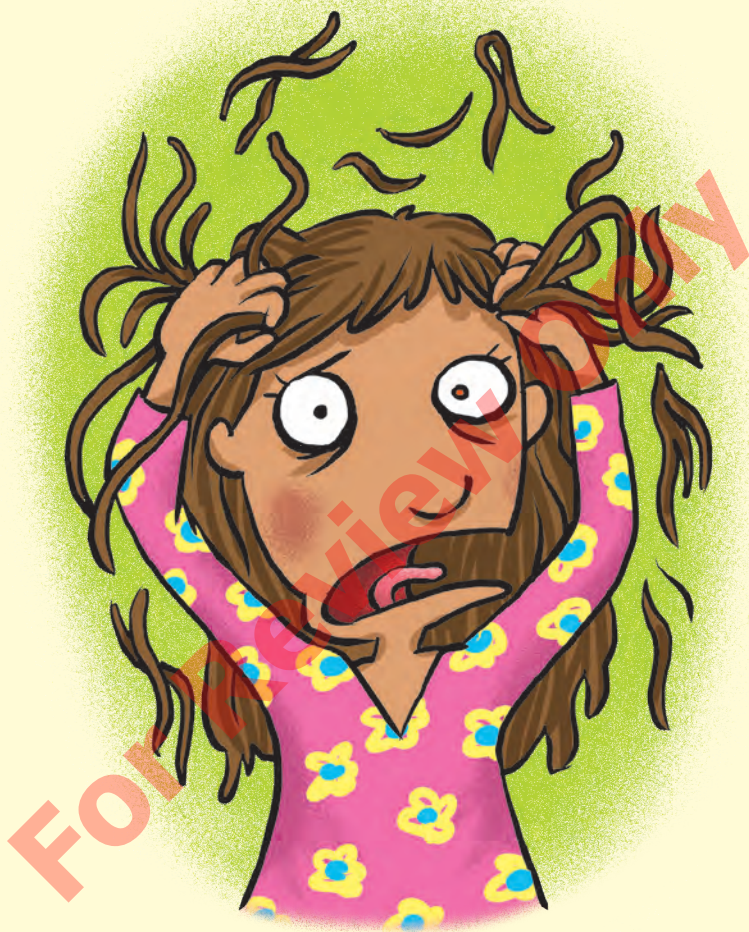

Hanging out instead of going home and doing your homework is called **procrastinating**. Procrastinating means: I'll think of a thousand things to do to keep me from doing my homework.



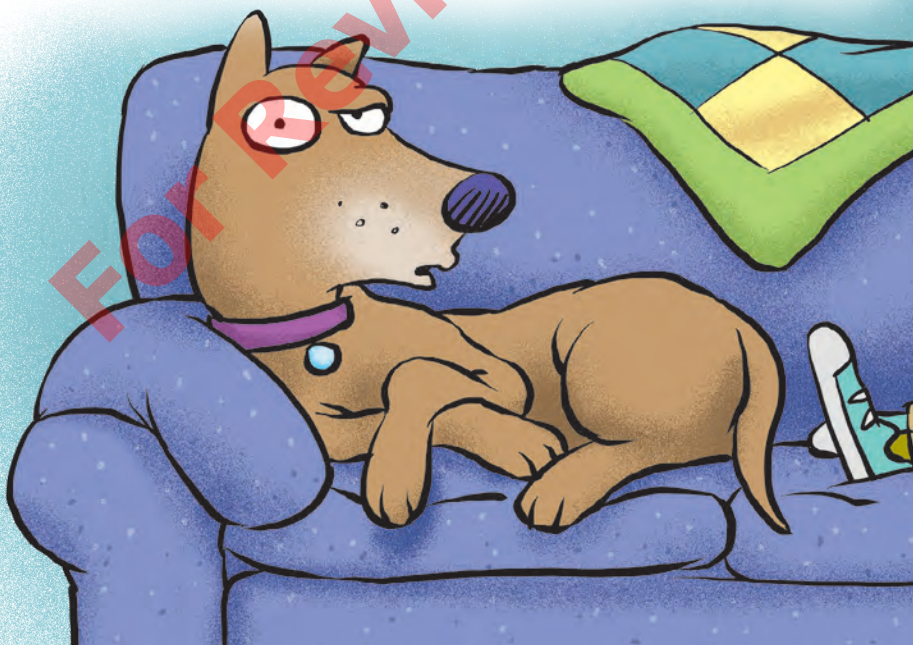


Do not pull out your hair because you have homework to do. (The homework won't get done, and you'll go bald.)
