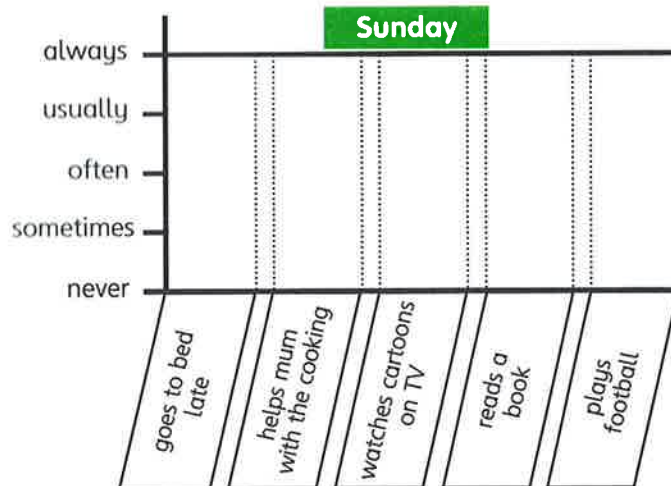
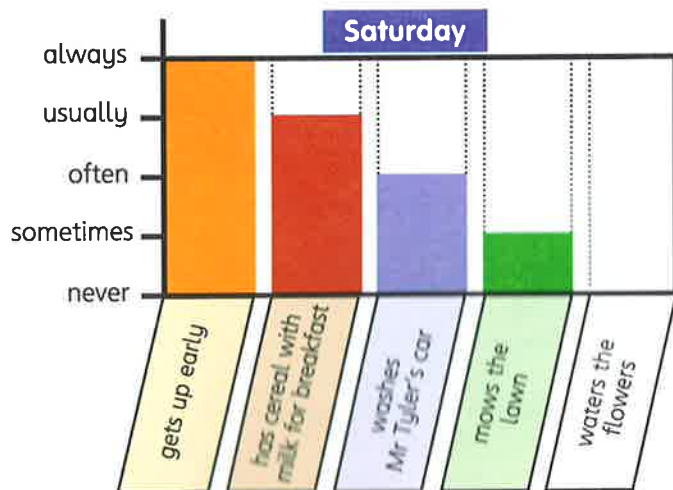

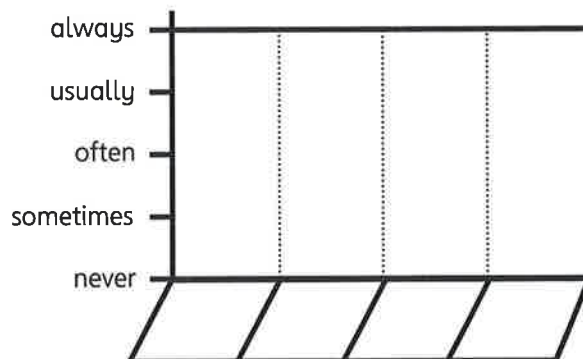
There's no school on Saturday or Sunday, but Tom always gets up early. He usually has cereal with milk for breakfast.

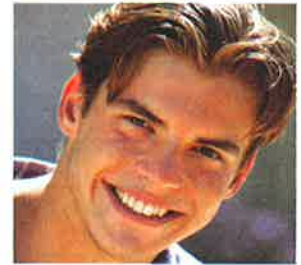
